There are contradictory reports regarding the opening of the air borders: Although there were announcements in October 2024 about a possible reopening, there has been no official confirmation to date. The situation can also change at very short notice. Travellers should check the current status with their airline.

Required entry forms and documents



Visa required for stay: No

Exception for cruise ship travellers: Passengers arriving in the Dominican Republic by cruise ship do not need to complete the e-ticket. The customs declaration and the international embarkation and disembarkation forms are displayed on board in paper form.

Extension of stay

The duration of stay in the Dominican Republic can be extended by up to 120 days by applying to the migration authority.

The situation can also change at very short notice. Travellers should check the current status with their airline.
